

ARTIFACT FEATURE





Israel and Fania (Katz) Berwald were from two small towns in Poland. Israel attended medical school in Poitier, France; Lausanne, Switzerland, and Genova, Italy while Fania studied midwifery. Israel and Fania were married November 19, 1933. A burlap covered wicker trunk held her trousseau.

Beginning in 1936, Israel's uncle Paul, CEO of Senak Shoe Company in St. Louis, Missouri, appealed to the US Consul for Israel and Fania to be able to immigrate from Poland. He wrote in 1937, "Knowing my nephew as I do and knowing that he is ambitious, industrious and of good habits, and knowing that under present conditions in Poland, he has no opportunities there, I am fully prepared to help the young man in every way possible after he gets here so that there is no danger of his becoming a public charge, but on the contrary, I feel certain that he will be able to make a good adjustment here and become a good American citizen."

Israel and Fania Berwald sailed to America aboard the SS Washington in March 1938, arriving in St. Louis shortly thereafter with their possessions packed in Fania's trousseau trunk. They lived first with Israel's Uncle Paul in Senate Apartments on Union Blvd. Israel obtained work at Lutheran Hospital and Christian Hospital before opening his own practice in late 1940. Fania learned English well enough to become a secretary at Senak Shoes. The couple gave birth to their son, David, in December 1940.

In Europe, the Katz and Berwald families left their homes following the Nazi invasion of Poland and settled in Slonim. Between July 1941 and March 1942, the Slonim ghetto was liquidated and all nearly 28,000 Jews were murdered. Israel and Fania Berwald received no letters from their families after June 1941.
