



International Holocaust Remembrance Day, January 27

This Tuesday, the Museum joins communities around the world in marking International Holocaust Remembrance Day, a day dedicated to honoring the six million Jews and millions of other victims murdered during the Holocaust.

In observance of the day, the Museum will be open to the public from 10 am - 4:30 pm and with admission as **pay-as-you-wish** all day long, welcoming visitors to reflect, learn, and bear witness in whatever way feels meaningful to them.

Beginning at 9 am and continuing through 4 pm, the Museum will host a **Reading of Names**, honoring individuals lost to the Holocaust. This powerful act of remembrance will take place throughout the day and will be available to view via livestream on our Facebook page and YouTube channel, allowing our wider community to participate wherever they are. In the evening, the Museum is honored to present our annual program made possible by the generous support Carole and Ken Adashek in honor of Holocaust Survivor, Rachel Miller. Additional support is provided by Kimberley and Timothy Eberlein and Nancy and Stephen Keyser. This year's program will feature the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra for a special presentation

celebrating the story and music of Rosy Wertheim, one of the first female composers in the Netherlands and a victim of the Holocaust. This moving program brings together history and music to illuminate a life cut short and a legacy that endures. *Please note: this event is sold out.*

We invite you to join us this International Holocaust Remembrance Day — in person or online — as we remember those who were lost and reaffirm our shared responsibility to carry their stories forward.

Artifact Feature



Magda Watts was born in Nyiregyhaza, Hungary. In 1944 she and her family, like many Hungarian Jews, were imprisoned by the Nazis. Magda was sent to Auschwitz, then to make bombs at a labor camp in Nuremberg. During this time, she began making small dolls from scrap materials, developing a method to trade them with guards for extra food rations, thus helping her and her sister Shari survive.

It wasn't until 1983 that Magda began making dolls again, this time from her home in Israel, and now as a way to process the trauma and grief of her experiences during the Holocaust. Her folk-art pieces and dioramas, such as this item from our Collection depicting a Shabbat dinner, are highly sought after collector's pieces. For Magda, they are a way to preserve a since-vanished way of Jewish life. "...Maybe I saw them," she said. "Maybe I know them."

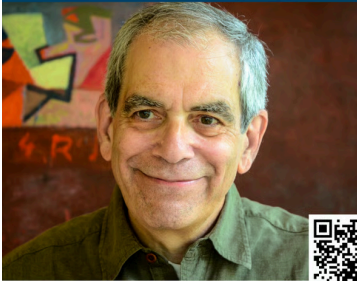
